Delivering the Big Plan for Ards and North Down

Since the publication of the Big Plan in March 2017, work has been ongoing to create a Delivery Plan to address the issues you highlighted during the Big Conversation. Your feedback helped to identify the five outcomes that make up the Big Plan.

Implementing the Big Plan will help ensure that by 2032 all people in Ards and North Down:

- 1. Fulfil their lifelong potential
- 2. Enjoy good health and wellbeing
- 3. Live in communities where they are respected, are safe and feel secure
- 4. Benefit from a prosperous economy
- 5. Feel pride from having access to a well-managed sustainable environment

The Big Plan is **not** a council plan, but the ambition and responsibility of all community planning partners to improve the outcomes of people living in Ards and North Down. For a full list of partners, please see page 8.

An initial set of actions has been agreed by Ards and North Down's Strategic Community Planning Partnership. This list of actions is not absolute and additional actions will be added throughout the 15-year lifespan of the Big Plan. A newly established 3rd Sector Community Planning Forum (see page 8) is currently working with the Council's Community Planning Service to ensure community and voluntary sector actions are reflected and incorporated into the delivery plan. Community planning is about recognising the collective impact of all actions that are needed to address the issues identified within the Big Plan for Ards and North Down.


There are two ways to provide feedback...

1. Complete a postcard

The 'Delivering the Big Plan for Ards and North Down' leaflet summarises a list of actions agreed by the Community Planning Partnership to implement the Big Plan. We would like to gather feedback to help the Partnership direct resources to where they are most needed. We also need to know if actions that could address issues that are of importance to you have been missed.

The leaflet contains a **survey postcard**. You can complete the postcard by circling your top three actions under each of the five outcomes of the Big Plan, either post it back to us for **FREE** or leave it in one of the designated post boxes throughout the borough (see opposite for details).

The postcard also contains a space for you to tell us what's missing. We ask for your postcode to see if we have gathered feedback from across the borough.

Meet Bethan...

Bethan is a twenty year old English student from St Mary's University College Belfast who joined the Community Planning team for five weeks on work placement. We asked Bethan a few questions to find out what she thought of community planning and what her hopes and aspirations are after graduation.

Why did you choose community planning for your work experience?

I chose Community Planning for my work experience because after a lot of research, I was extremely interested in "The Big Plan" and its effects on the community that I am a part of. Equally, after reading about the links that Community Planning has with a number of different partners (both statutory and non-statutory) I felt that it would be beneficial to witness the cooperation between them first hand. Community Planning has taught me the benefits of working together to achieve a common goal.

What do you think is the biggest challenge facing graduates today from Ards and North Down?

I honestly think that the biggest challenge today for graduates is the negativity surrounding getting a job after graduation. I have a lot of friends studying a range of subjects all being told "there's no jobs in that field", which is extremely disheartening for hardworking students. With regards to Ards and North Down, I think that it's challenging that in order to obtain a higher paying job, it seems necessary to travel to Belfast or further out of the borough. Although the money is an incentive to travel further, it would be great to be able to have access to these higher paying jobs a little closer to home.

After graduation what are your plans?

After graduating, I plan to do a lot of volunteering for a year or two in order to build up my experience alongside my current part time work. Due to being involved in part time work commitments and full time education up until June when I graduate, I haven't had the time to get involved with the charity work that I would like to become a part of. I hope that this will eventually lead me to a permanent job in the third sector. I would also be interested in taking part in a sign language class.

What have types of experience have you gained in community planning?

I have gained invaluable experience and knowledge through attending a number of meetings which proved to me that it is possible for the strategic partners to work together to improve the general quality of life in the borough. Equally, I have been made aware of a number of charities and organisations that offer services that I otherwise wouldn't have known existed. Community Planning has taught me the importance of working together in order to achieve common goals.

Which outcome is most important to you and why?

I feel that outcome one, the social aspect of the "Big Plan" is the most important to me. In particular, "All people in Ards and North Down fulfil their lifelong potential". I think that the wording of this outcome is particularly important as it takes into consideration that people have very different skills and qualities and allows them to fulfil their own personal potential without being compared to one another.

Where do you see yourself in five years?

In five years, I would like to be in a comfortable job in the third sector where I truly believe I could make a difference to society. I would like to have moved into my own house and be encouraging others to volunteer. I hope to have experienced the food in a number of countries too by the time I'm 25. I always thought when I was younger that I had to have my dream job as soon as I stepped out of university, but now I'm realising that being happy is the most important thing- so if I'm still happy, healthy and surrounded by friends in five years, I'll consider myself very lucky.

What actions would you like to see in the delivery plan?

There are no actions that I would like to add to the delivery plans but I would take a keen interest in seeing if the provision for mental health facilities could be improved in our borough. As mental health is no longer stigmatised and increasing numbers of people are reaching out for support, I feel that it's of great importance that the services are there to support the citizens within the borough. It would be interesting to explore different ways that this issue could be dealt with, and note practical ways in which volunteers could get involved.

A focus on education in Ards and North Down What the statistics show:

Out of 1,749 people from Ards and North Down who left school in 2015/16:

84% had achieved at least 5 GCSEs grades A*-C

71% had achieved at least 5 GCSEs grades A*-C including English and Maths

59% had achieved 2 A-levels or equivalent

41% went to higher education

40% went to further education

6% went into training

10% were unemployed

3% unknown

The Integrated Strategy for Tourism, Regeneration and Economic Development 2018-2030

Ards and North Down Borough Council launched the first Integrated Strategy of its kind for the borough at a special event in Orange Tree House on Wednesday, 28 March 2018.

At the event attendees were introduced to the Integrated Strategy which sets out an ambitious plan for the future of the borough for the next 12 years.



Built on an evidence base that identifies the key assets of the borough and engagement with stakeholders from the public, private and community sectors, the Integrated Strategy has taken its lead from community planning and has been developed to support the vision and outcomes of the Big Plan for Ards and North Down.

Centred around three key themes: **place**, **visitor** and **investment** and six thematic priorities, the borough wide strategy focuses on a holistic and partnership approach to achieve job creation, increased economic productivity and increased visitor overnight trips and expenditure.

The Integrated Strategy concentrates on three particular strengths of Ards and North Down:


- The natural landscape of sea, loughs and land—a blue green space.
- The creativity of our people, from earliest times to present day producers, artisans, designers and engineers.
- Our proximity to places of opportunity—to Belfast, neighbouring districts, to the Republic of Ireland and Great Britain, to Europe and the world beyond.

Throughout the strategy's 12 year life span, the Council and its many partners will work to deliver 19 integrated actions. These actions will help us achieve outcomes 4 and 5 of the Big Plan, which focuses on economic development, skills and employment, tourism and the natural, built and digital environment.

The Integrated Strategy should act as a point of reference for all those contributing to the growth of our economy, the welcoming of visitors and the improvement of our places, both urban and rural.

The Big Game—be the first to play!



We are always thinking of new ways to interest people in the Big Plan so we can use your local knowledge and experience to improve public services. Your feed back helps to make the Big Plan and its delivery relevant to you and the issues you feel should be prioritised by Community Planning Partners in Ards and North Down!

To try and get the best feedback we needed to come up with something interactive and fun. After a long brainstorming session we came up with our very own community planning board game, we call it The Big Game!

The Big Game can be played in teams or with a small group of people. The board game is divided into 8 topic areas including connectivity and transport and the natural, built and historic environment.

The aim of The Big Game is to identify what actions players would prioritise from the Delivery Plan under the 8 topic areas. Players will be asked to choose what partners need to be involved to implement the action and how the action will be funded.

Update on activities

Community Planning in Ards and North Down has created opportunities for collaborative working to take forward a number of key issues identified in the Big Plan. Please see a few examples below:

Age friendly Alliance

The number of older people aged 65+ is projected to increase from 31,000 in 2014 to around 50,000 by 2030. As a result we need to respond to the needs of the people who live in the borough.

An Age-friendly Alliance, established in March 2018, will help make Ards and North Down an age-friendly borough and a great place for people to grow older. The Age-friendly Alliance is developing a strategy which is being populated via input from services users across all age categories.

Community resuscitation group

The Big Plan is focused on increasing wellbeing by developing individual and community resilience. A specialist interest group is creating an action plan that will help improve knowledge of cardiac resuscitation within communities, schools and businesses and promote the Chain of Survival.

3rd Sector Community Planning Forum

People are at the heart of community planning. The 3rd Sector Forum was established in December 2017 to ensure the voice of the community and voluntary sector is reflected in the delivery and monitoring of the Big Plan for Ards and North Down.
