As Borough signage was relatively new and adding any temporary stickers to them may take away from the visual finish and the lack of budget for new signage it was recommended that the enhanced messages mentioned above and running throughout the year could achieve improved coverage without the need for new borough signage. Fairtrade UK and Fairtrade Ireland had also confirmed that it was not a requirement of our Fairtrade accreditation to have Fairtrade Signage on our Borough boundaries.
