Ards and North Down Borough Council (the Council/ANDBC) is required to complete an application process to receive funding to carry out detailed design on the potential development of Whitespots Country Park.

The project will deliver a £9.3M capital value environmental improvement scheme at Whitespots Country Park and surrounding areas. The Scheme boundary includes existing and new paths within Clandeboye Estate, Whitespots Country Park and Land at South of Whitespots. The Environmental improvement scheme shall see the use of sustainable material and creative design to deliver a safe and attractive destination for pedestrians through the Country Park, as well as one that celebrates and interprets the local history and architectural heritage.

The nature and scope of the service will predominantly comprise a combination of landscape and civil engineering design elements to enable the Council to deliver environmental improvement works.

6. Please provide details of the aims and/or objectives of the Policy, Strategy, Plan or **Public Service.**

Aims:

The environmental improvement scheme is to improve access and the ambience of the area identified.

- connecting tourist destinations within Newtownards town, the new City of Bangor and the wider **Belfast Region**
- wider and more connected paths throughout the Country Park and neighbouring Estates.
- improving street lighting and car park at the main entrance.
- resurfacing existing paths and creating new with sustainable material
- the incorporation of furniture and art
- possible improvement of traffic flow at the main entrance
- reflect and enhance the history of the site through new and existing features
- tree and shrub planting
- creation of a green link between Newtownards and City of Bangor

The current Country Park has not had investment at all except for grass cutting and verge clearance around historic features and is very hazardous with regard to uneven surfaces, lack of proper drainage and poor signage throughout. Upgrading these obvious issues will directly benefit some of the core section 75 groups, especially in regard to mobility.

Health and Wellbeing: Increase the number of local residents using the facilities for recreation and active leisure above the numbers using the facilities as at year 0.

Environmental Sustainability: Ensure the natural plant and animal species associated with the site in Year 0 are retained on the Site:

Ensure local schools, community groups and charities have visited the site for environmental education related purpose;

Implement an annual biodiversity audit on the Whitespots and Clandeboye sites:

Achieve an increase in the numbers using the greenways compared to the baseline following completion.



Employability and Skills: Create new full-time equivalent jobs within the Whitespots and Clandeboye sites directly because of the Complementary Fund financed capital development.

Provide training to employees and volunteers to improve skills and employability;

Provide volunteering opportunities (to assist employability).

Tourism and economic development: Ensure Whitespots Park and Clandeboye Estate is recognised as providing a positive economic impact within reports from ANDBC Tourism team and Tourism NI (or equivalent organisations);

Record an overall increase in the number of domestic visitors when compared to in the year ending March 2019;

Record an overall increase in the number of visitors from ROI, UK and Out-of-State when compared to in the year ending March 2020.

Sexual Orientation

It should be noted that no reliable data is available on sexual orientation-NISRA are currently examining methodology on how to measure this. However, the 2011 census indicates that less than 1% of the Northern Ireland adult population (those aged 16 years and over) were in a registered same-sex civil partnership. This was similar to the borough as a whole. The Continuous Household Survey in Northern Ireland estimated this figure between 0.9% and 1.9% in 2015-2016. The Office for National Statistics estimates a similar range for the United Kingdom (1.7%).
